


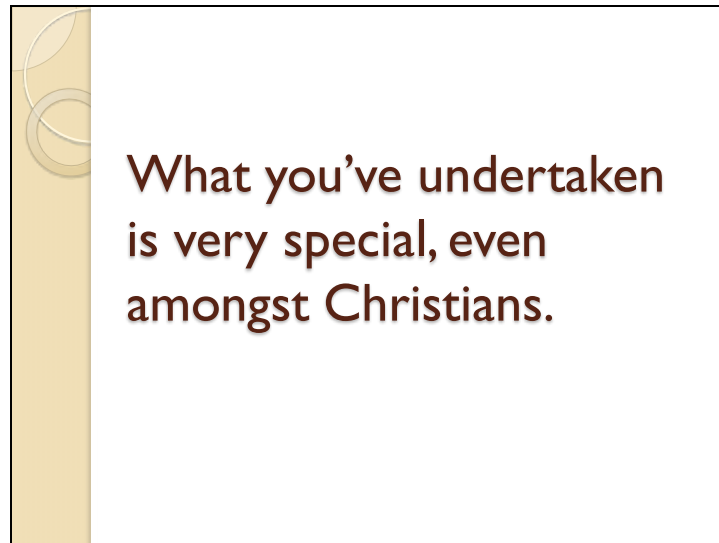

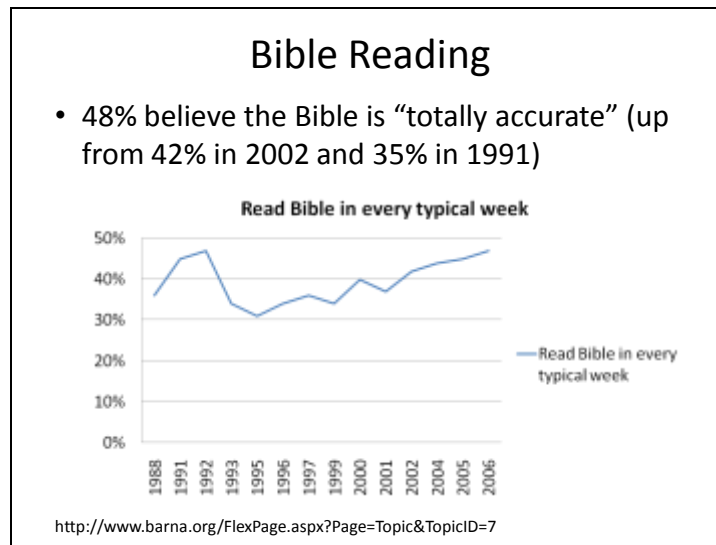


I'm going to start with some very sad news....

Statistics from Barna group: all across the board. Some say 50s had the best Bible reading. Some trends indicate today's just as good. Raise your hand if you've read all the way thru the Bible...

If you live in the Southeast, you're 20-30% more likely to be a "regular Bible reader" than a northeasterner. If you're a female, you're probably reading your Bible 10% more than your male friends. African Americans read their Bibles more than Whites, typically.


Even at Burns, this is something incredible.

It's enjoyable to read the Bible!

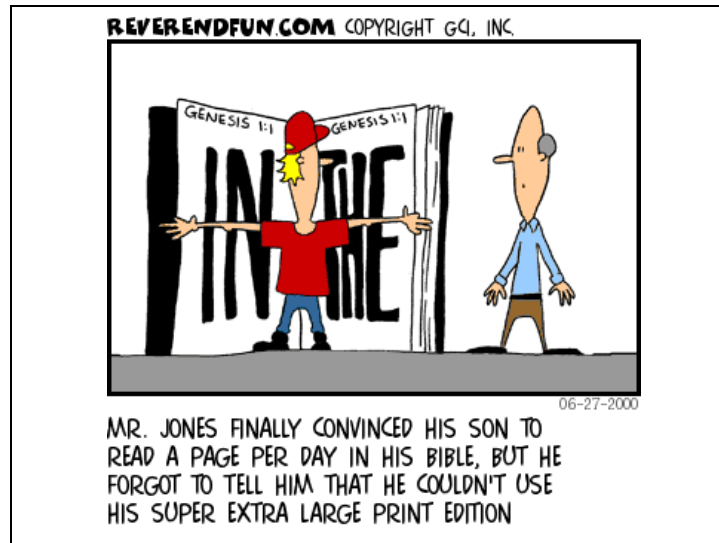

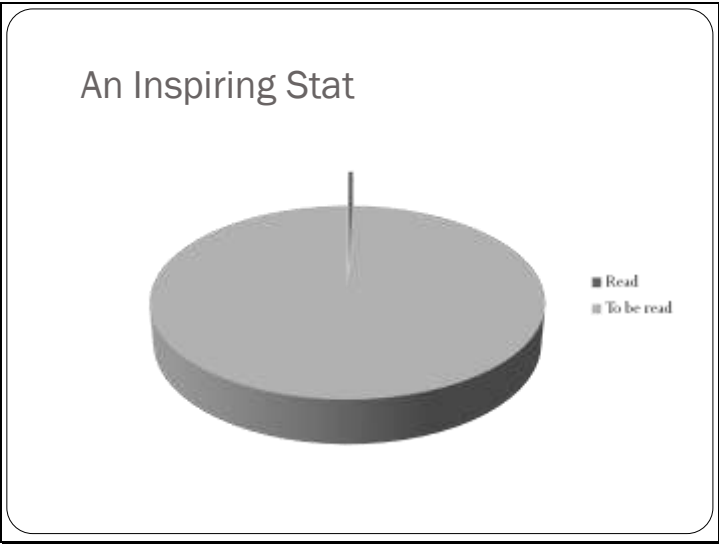
